

Outlaw



And through his friends, Robin Hood finds the courage to become a legendary hero.



Beetle Boy








Flour Babies

Wonder



The Boy in the Tower




Ade loves living at the top of a tower block.


The Boy at the Back of the Class


Cosmic


Pigheart Boy

The Butterfly Lion






Danny the Champion of the World




Cymbeline Igloo has NEVER been swimming But how hard can it be? He's Googled front crawl and he's found his dad's old pair of trunks. He's totally ready.






The London Eye Mystery


Village by the Sea


I Know What You Did Last Wednesday

Diary of a Wimpy Kid






The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe


Artemis Fowl


The Diddakoi

Billionaire Boy




Joe has a lot of reasons to be happy. About a billion of them, in fact.


